What texts do we cover?

Across the 2 years you will cover:

- Othello - William Shakespeare
- Never Let Me Go - Kazuo Ishiguro
- Frankenstein - Mary Shelley
- A Streetcar Named Desire - Tennessee Williams
- The Duchess of Malfi - John Webster
- A selection of post-2000 poetry
- Selected Poems - John Donne

What should I start reading?

We start with Othello so it's always useful to have an idea of the plot and the main themes before we start to analyse how Shakespeare uses language and stagecraft to explore the ideas of the play.

Activity

We've included 3 of the most famous lines from Shakespeare's famous tragedy for you to look up and research. Find out which character says them, to whom and what idea the line is exploring. When you've done all 3 you should have a pretty good idea of the plot of Othello!

- 'Reputation, reputation, reputation! O, I have lost my reputation! I have lost the immortal part of myself, and what remains is bestial' (Act 2 Scene 2)
- 'O, beware, my lord, of jealousy:
It is the green-eyed monster which doth mock
The meat it feeds on'
(Act 3 Scene 3)
- 'O, now, forever, / Farewell the tranquil mind; farewell content' (Act 3 Scene 3)

What's next?!

Othello is what we might call a classical tragedy. Have a look at some of the conventions of this genre and think about how Othello might adhere to these.
